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### **Important Safeguards**

In addition to the careful attention devoted to quality standards in the manufacturing process of your product, safety is a major factor in the design of every instrument. However, safety is your responsibility too. This sheet lists important information that will help to ensure your enjoyment and proper use of the product and accessory equipment. Please read them carefully before operating and using your product.

### 1.1 General Precautions

- 1. All warnings and instructions in this manual should be followed.
- Remove the plug from the outlet before cleaning. Do not use liquid aerosol detergents. Use a water-dampened cloth for cleaning.
- 3. Do not use this product in humid or wet places.
- 4. Keep enough space around the product for ventilation. Slots and openings in the storage cabinet should not be blocked.
- 5. It is highly recommended to connect the product to a surge protector to protect from damage caused by electrical surges. It is also recommended to connect the product to an uninterruptible power supply (UPS), which has an internal battery that will keep the product running in the event of a power outage.

### CAUTION

Maintain electrical safety. Power line operated equipment or accessories connected to this product should bear the UL listing mark or CSA certification mark on the accessory itself and should not be modified so as to defeat the safety features. This will help avoid any potential hazard from electrical shock or fire. If in doubt, contact qualified service personnel.

### 1.2 Installation

- 1. **Read and Follow Instructions:** All the safety and operating instructions should be read before the product is operated. Follow all operating instructions.
- 2. **Retain Instructions:** The safety and operating instructions should be retained for future reference.
- 3. Heed Warnings: Comply with all warnings on the product and in the operating instructions.
- Polarization: Do not defeat the safety purpose of the polarized or grounding-type plug. A polarized plug has two blades with one wider than the other.



A grounding type plug has two blades and a third grounding prong.



The wide blade or the third prong are provided for your safety.

If the provided plug does not fit into your outlet, consult an electrician for replacement of the obsolete outlet.

5. Power Sources: This product should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supplied to your location, consult your video dealer or local power company. For products intended to operate from battery power, or other sources, refer to the operating instructions.

- 6. **Overloading:** Do not overload wall outlets or extension cords as this can result in the risk of fire or electric shock. Overloaded AC outlets, extension cords, frayed power cords, damaged or cracked wire insulation, and broken plugs are dangerous. They may result in a shock or fire hazard. Periodically examine the cord, and if its appearance indicates damage or deteriorated insulation, have it replaced by your service technician.

An uninterruptible power supply has an internal battery that will keep the product running in the event of a power outage. Uninterruptible power supplies should bear the UL listing mark or CSA certification mark.
- 10. Ventilation: Slots and openings in the case are provided for ventilation to ensure reliable operation of the product and to protect it from overheating. These openings must not be blocked or covered. The openings should never be blocked by placing the product on a bed, sofa, rug, or other similar surface. This product should never be placed near or over a radiator or heat register. This product should not be placed in a built-in installation such as a bookcase or rack unless proper ventilation is provided and the product manufacturer's instructions have been followed.
- 11. Attachments: Do not use attachments unless recommended by the product manufacturer as they may cause a hazard.

- 17. **Camera Installation:** Cameras are not intended for submersion in water. Not all cameras can be installed outdoors. Check your camera environmental rating to confirm if they can be installed outdoors. When installing cameras outdoors, installation in a sheltered area is required.

#### 1.3 Service

1. **Servicing:** Do not attempt to service this product yourself, as opening or removing covers may expose you to dangerous voltage or other hazards. Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel.

- 2. **Conditions Requiring Service:** Unplug this product from the wall outlet and refer servicing to qualified service personnel under the following conditions:
  - When the power supply cord or plug is damaged.
  - If liquid has been spilled or objects have fallen into the product.
  - If the product has been exposed to rain or water.
  - If the product has been dropped or the cabinet has been damaged
  - If the product does not operate normally by following the operating instructions. Adjust only those controls that are covered by the operating instructions. Improper adjustment of other controls may result in damage and will often require extensive work by a qualified technician to restore the product to its normal operation.
  - When the product exhibits a distinct change in performance. This indicates a need for service.
- 3. **Replacement Parts:** When replacement parts are required, have the service technician verify that the replacements used have the same safety characteristics as the original parts. Use of replacements specified by the product manufacturer can prevent fire, electric shock, or other hazards.

### 1.4 Use


- 1. **Cleaning:** Unplug the product from the wall outlet before cleaning. Do not use liquid cleaners or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning.
- 2. **Product and Cart Combination:** When product is installed on a cart, product and cart combination should be moved with care. Quick stops, excessive force, and uneven surfaces may cause the product and cart combination to overturn.
- 3. **Object and Liquid Entry:** Never push objects of any kind into this product through openings as they may touch dangerous voltage points or "short-out" parts that could result in a fire or electric shock. Never spill liquid of any kind on the product.
- 4. Lightning: For added protection of this product during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet and disconnect the antenna or cable system. This will prevent damage to the product due to lightning and power line surges.




3. QR Code	QR code to setup the NVR on the Lorex Cirrus app.

5. Ethernet Port	Port for the Ethernet cable that connects to your net- work for local and remote connectivity.
6. MicroSD slot	Slot for a MicroSD card (included for specific models).
7. Power port (12V)	Port for the the included 12V DC power adapter.
8. USB Ports (x2)	Port for a USB mouse or a USB flash drive (not in- cluded) for the purposes of backing up recorded video. For more details on storage options, see 12 <i>Storage</i> , page 34.


### **Basic Setup**

### 4.1 STEP 1: Set up the Recorder


1. Connect the NVR Power Supply: Connect the included NVR power supply to your recorder and a power outlet.



2. Connect to your network: Connect your recorder to your Wi-Fi router using the included Ethernet cable.




- 3. (Optional) Connect your mouse and display:
  - Connect the included USB mouse to the USB port on your recorder.
  - Connect your recorder to your display using the included HDMI cable. The HDMI supports up to 4K resolution.



### 4.2 STEP 2: Download the Lorex Cirrus App

To enable remote viewing, you will need to:

- Have high-speed Internet
- · Have an upload and download speed of 10Mbps



Connect to your system using the Lorex Cirrus app from your smartphone (iOS and Android).

#### To connect to the Lorex Cirrus app:

1. Download the Lorex Cirrus app by scanning the QR code.



- 2. Open the Lorex Cirrus app.
- 3. Tap 🛨.
- 4. Select your device from the Network list or tap Scan QR Code.
- 5. Follow the in-app instructions to complete the setup.

### Note:

- Make sure you are on the same network as the NVR.
- If you cannot find your device on the network, scan the QR code or enter the device ID manually, and input the following: Default password: 00000000

6. Add the cameras to the recorder through the Lorex Cirrus app or the recorder interface.



- Your cameras will appear on the Home screen of the app. Tap the play button ( ) to stream live video on channels that are in sleep mode.
   Note: If you do not see video from one or more cameras, ensure you have removed the protective film on the battery contacts and camera lens. If the issue persists, see 19 *Trouble*-

shooting, page 69.

### 4.3 STEP 3: Camera Setup

Prepare the cameras and battery cells. The battery cell comes partially charged (due to safety regulations). Please, fully charge the battery before use and setup. You can charge the battery pack inside or outside of the camera.

- 1. Pull and remove the sticker on the battery cell contacts.
- 2. Lift the Power Port cover, connect your camera to a micro-USB cord and adapter, and then connect to an outlet.



Insert the fully charged battery into the bottom of the camera.
 Note: You will hear a 'beep' when the battery is properly inserted. If you do not here a click, remove the battery by squeezing the release tabs, and then re-insert.




### 4.4 STEP 4: Installing the Cameras

### 4.4.1 Installation Guidelines


Install the camera on a wall per the guidelines below to optimize battery life.

Note: Battery life is dependent on placement, settings, frequency and length of events, and ambient temperature.




- It is recommended to place your camera at least 7 ft (2.1 m) above the ground and angle it slightly downward toward the monitoring area, excluding any busy areas (e.g., sidewalks or roadways).
- Position the camera no more than 20 ft (6.1 m) away from the area you wish to monitor.
- Install the camera within range of the NVR.
- Position the camera so that objects of interest will move from side-to-side across the camera image, rather than moving towards or away from the camera.
- Ensure the camera image is free of obstructions (i.e., tree branches).
- This camera is weather resistant for outdoor use (IP66 rated). Installation in a sheltered location is recommended.
- It is recommended that you customize motion settings for each camera on your system. See 4.4.3 *Optimizing Battery Life*, page 12 for full details.

### 4.4.2 Mounting the Cameras




- 1. Set the Mounting Bracket to the desired mounting position.
- 2. Mark holes through the Mounting Bracket
- 3. Using the included screwdriver, secure the bracket with the provided mounting screws. **Optional:** On drywall, use the provided drill bit to drill holes where marked, then use the provided anchors and screws.
- 4. Align the camera's Mounting Plate Slots to the tabs in the Mounting Bracket. Push in and slide down to secure in place.



- 5. Insert the Fastener Screw through the fastener on the top of the Mounting Bracket, then tighten using the screwdriver.
- 6. Tighten the pre-installed Locking screw using the screwdriver.

Note: To remove the battery pack in the future, loosen the Locking Screw.





7. Turn the adjustment ring counter-clockwise to loosen and reposition the camera. Turn the adjustment ring clockwise to secure the desired position.


### 4.4.3 Optimizing Battery Life

Customize motion detection settings to ensure motion events are being recorded and reduce false alarms.

### To optimize battery life from the Lorex Cirrus app:

- 1. Open the Lorex Cirrus app.
- 2. Select the camera channel.
- 3. Tap (1), then tap Motion Detection Settings.

4. Configure the following:



- Select Person Detection: Tap Detection Type, and then tap Person.
- Reduce the Distance Setting to less than 50%: Slide the bar to the desired percentage.



5. Tap Save when finished. Repeat for other cameras on the system.

### To optimize battery life from the NVR:

• Disable the deterrence light:

From the NVR, right-click > click **Setup** > click **Alarm** > click **Deterrence** > click and drag to deselect the schedule.

• Create an activity zone:

From the NVR, right-click > click  $\overrightarrow{\texttt{BE}}$  > click **Setup** > click **Alarm** > from the **Area** field click **Setup**.

### 4.5 Quick Access to System Information


### To quickly open a window with system information:

• Right-click to open the Taskbar at the bottom of the screen, then click on the recorder's Taskbar.

**Note:** The QR code shown in the System Info screen can be scanned during setup to enter the system's Device ID.

### Using the Mouse

The mouse is the primary control device for the system. Connect the included mouse to the USB port on the rear of the NVR.



### 1. Left Button:

• In live view, while in a split-screen display mode, click an individual channel to view it in full-screen. Click again to return to the split-screen display mode.

### 2. Scroll Wheel:

- In menus, scroll to move up / down through the menu content.
- While inside the Audio volume control, scroll to turn system volume up / down.

### 3. Right Button:


- During live viewing in split-screen view, click to open the Taskbar (see 6.1 *Using the Taskbar*, page 15).
- In menus, click to go back / close menus.

# Using the Recorder's On-Screen Display

Use the system's on-screen display to navigate menus and configure options and settings.

### 6.1 Using the Taskbar

The **Taskbar** along the bottom of the recorder's main display allows you to access the Main Menu and control basic functions of the recorder.



- 1. Main Menu: Opens the Main Menu for browsing. For details on Main Menu functions, see 13 Using the Main Menu, page 36.
- 2. Viewing Options: Select how many channels are shown on screen during live viewing.
- 3. **Playback:** Opens the Playback Menu. This allows you to search for video recordings saved on the recorder's storage. For details on using the Playback menu, see 8 *Playback*, page 21.
- 4. Audio Controls: Click to open the Audio volume controls. Use the scroll bar to change the
  - system volume. Click to mute / unmute the system.
- 5. Auto Upgrade: Checks for an available firmware update.
- 6. Network Status: Displays the recorder's network connection status.
- 7. System Information: Displays system information.
- 8. System Date & Time: Shows the date and time of the system.
- Pin / Unpin Taskbar: Choose to always show the Taskbar on screen ( ) or hide it unless the mouse pointer is near the bottom of the screen ( ).

6.2 Using the Mini Menu

The Mini Menu lets you perform quick functions for a specific channel on the recorder.

### To use the Mini Menu:

Hover the mouse near the top of a channel with a connected camera.

The Mini Menu opens at the top of the camera's live display:



- 1. Move Mini Menu: Click-and-drag to move the Mini Menu to a different part of the screen.
- Pair: Click to pair a wire-free camera to the selected channel. For more information on pairing, see 11 *Pairing Cameras*, page 32.

**Note:** If a camera is already paired to the selected channel, the new pairing process will override it.

### 6.3 Using the On-Screen Keypads

The **Full Keypad** is used to input alphanumeric characters, such as in user name or password fields. The **Number Keypad** is used to input numeric characters only, such as in the time or date fields.

### To use the Full Keypad:

- 1. Using the mouse, click on a field where alphanumeric characters are entered, such as the user name and password fields.
  - The Full Keypad opens:



- Click to switch between uppercase and lowercase characters.
   Note: Uppercase entry mode also reveals more special characters on the far-right side of the keyboard.
- Click / to move the cursor.
- Click to backspace / delete characters.
- Click to confirm what you have entered.
- Right-click to close the Full Keypad.

### To use the Number Keypad:

- 1. Using the mouse, click on a field where numeric characters are entered, such as the date or time fields.
  - The Number Keypad opens:


- Click / to move the cursor between letters.
- Click to backspace / delete numbers.
- Click to confirm what you have entered.
- Right-click to close the Number Keypad.

### Recording

By default, the system is set to record motion events from all connected cameras. It is recommended that you use the Lorex Cirrus app to optimize camera motion detection regions so that only objects of interest will trigger recording (see 4.4.3 *Optimizing Battery Life*, page 12 for details).

When a camera is recording video, the type of recording is shown with an icon in the bottom-left corner of the camera image.



You may see one of the following icons:

- Motion Recording: The system has detected motion and is recording the event.
- Continuous / Manual Recording: One of 2 actions may be occurring:
  - 1. Manual recording has been enabled and the system is currently recording video.
  - 2. Certain wire-free systems have an option for continuous recording. In order to take advantage of continuous recording:
    - Your recorder must have a hard drive installed recorders that use microSD card storage do not support continuous recording.
    - Connect any cameras you want to record continuously to a power outlet using a USB power adapter.
    - Change the camera's recording time to **Continuous** (see 7.1 *Recording Time for Motion Detection*, page 17) and set a continuous recording schedule (see 7.4 *Setting a Recording Schedule*, page 19).

#### 7.1 Recording Time for Motion Detection

When the camera detects motion, the camera will stream live video and record for a set period of time before returning to standby mode. You can choose how long each camera records for when motion is detected.

### To configure recording time:

1. From the Live View screen, click **Setup** > **Camera** > **Camera** Setup.

- 2. From the list of channels, find the camera you want to configure.
- 3. Click the drop-down arrow, then select a period of time the camera will record video **after** motion is detected.
- (OPTIONAL) Click the drop-down arrow beside Camera Recording Time to select a period of time for all connected cameras.

5. Click Save.

### Note:

- You should configure motion detection settings to ensure objects of interest are being recorded. For full instructions, see 13.2.11 *Configuring Motion Detection Settings*, page 44.
- Depending on your system, you may have the option to record continuously by setting **Camera Recording Time** to **Continuous**. This option is only available on systems that use a hard drive for storage rather than a microSD card, and only on cameras which have a continuous wired connection to power.

#### To enable continuous recording:

- 1. The camera must be connected to continuous power. To purchase the cable and adapter (ACPWF1), go to lorex.com.
- 2. From the Live View screen, click **Setup** > **Setup** > **Camera** > **Camera** Setup.
- from the Camera Recording Time drop-down menu, click and select Continuous. The continuous recording option will only appear for the camera with a wired connection to power.

### 7.2 Configuring Manual Recording

The system will automatically record video when motion is detected by a camera. You can also use **manual recording** to record a video file with a custom start and stop time. By default, manual recording is enabled on all channels.

### To enable / disable manual recording:

1. From the Live View screen, click **Setup** > **Setup** > **Recording** > **Record Setup**.

- 2. From the list of channels, find the camera you want to configure, then click the check box to enable / disable manual recording.
- 3. Click Save.

### 4. (OPTIONAL)

- Click the drop-down arrow beside **Recording**, then select **ON** or **OFF** to enable / disable manual recording for all connected cameras.
- Use the **Copy** function to copy your settings to another or all connected cameras. See 13.1.1 *Copying Channel Settings to Another Channel*, page 36 for details on using the copy function.

#### 7.3 Changing Recording Resolution and Preview

The battery cameras are capable of recording at **720p** (720x1280), **1080p** (1080x1920), **2K** (2560x1440), **4K** (3840x2160) or **Auto**.

You can also change the preview of the recording to prioritize clarity or smoothness of the video quality.

**Note:** Video Quality at the time of recording is dependent on your Wi-Fi network strength, the number of devices on your network, etc.,

### To change recording resolution and preview:

1. From the Live View screen, click **Setup** > **Setup** > **Recording** > **Record Setup**.

- 2. Select a channel, and then select a resolution (720p, 1080p, 2K, 4K) or **Auto** to conserve battery life.
- 3. Select a channel, and then select Smooth or Clear for the Video Preview.
- 4. Click Save.

### 7.4 Setting a Recording Schedule

By default, the system is set to record whenever a camera detects motion. You have the option to set a recording schedule so that a particular camera only records at certain times. The recording schedule repeats weekly and can be configured differently per camera.


### To set a recording schedule:

1. From the Live View screen, click **Setup** > **Setup** > **Recording** > **Schedule**.



2. Click the drop down next to Channel to select a channel.

3. Click or click-and-hold over existing bars to remove sections from the recording schedule. For blank areas of the schedule, click or click-and-drag to add sections to the recording schedule.



**Note:** If your system and the selected channel support continuous recording, you will have the option to choose between **Motion** and **Continuous** schedules for each day of the week. Continuous recording will only occur if you set a recording schedule.

- 4. Click Save.
- 5. **(OPTIONAL)** Use the **Copy** function to copy your settings to another or all connected cameras. See 13.1.1 *Copying Channel Settings to Another Channel*, page 36 for details on using the copy function.

### Playback

You can view and back up recorded video on the recorder.


To access playback:

### 8.1 Using Playback

Play back video recordings from a specific date and time.

### To search for and play back videos:

- 1. Open the Playback menu:
  - Right-click in the Live View screen to open the Taskbar, then click OR
  - Right-click in the Live View screen to open the Taskbar, click
     Search



- 2. Click on the right side of the **Date** to select the date to search for video recordings from.
- 3. Check off the channels you would like to search for recordings from on the left-side of the screen.
- 4. Click to search for recordings.
- Recordings that fit your search criteria appear. Double-click an event to begin playback. Note: Recordings appear as thumbnails by default. Use the viewing buttons in the bottom-right corner to toggle between thumbnail ( ) and list view ( ).

#### 8.2 Playback Controls

Once you have started playing a video clip, the playback controls appear as shown below.



1. **Event List:** Shows all video clips that fit your original search criteria. Double-click any event to begin playback, or check multiple events to perform a backup.

### 2. Backup and Playback Buttons:

- Click Lo play the currently selected video clip.

- 14. Manual Capture: Click to take a snapshot.
- 15. Timeframe: Use the timeframe options to view a smaller or larger time period.
- 16. **Timeline:** Continuous recordings are shown with colored bars to represent different types of recording (legend shown in the bottom-left corner of the display).
- 17. Video Playback Area: Double-click any channel to view in full screen.
- 18. Exit Playback: Return to the previous screen.

# Storage

Your recorder has multiple storage options for video files. Depending on your system configuration, your recorder may have come with a pre-installed hard drive or a MicroSD card.

You may also connect a USB storage device to the USB port labelled **Storage** on your recorder for redundant storage. This means the system will automatically create a backup of the most recent recordings on the USB drive as well as recording to the primary storage.

#### 12.1 Configuring Storage Overwrite

By default, your storage device is set to overwrite automatically, meaning that the system deletes the oldest footage when storage is full to make way for new recordings. You can also select a number of days or hours the system should retain data for. For example, if you select 30 days, only recordings more than 30 days old will be overwritten.

#### To configure overwrite:

1. From the Live View screen, click **Setup** > **Device** > **Storage**.

  - OFF: No footage will be overwritten.

CAUTION

If you turn off overwrite and your hard drive fills up with footage, the system will stop recording.

Formatting deletes all saved files from the selected storage device. It is recommended to format any newly-installed storage device before recording.
